DFARG Monthly Meeting, March 21, 2019

- 1. David Graham, President of DFARG, called the well attended meeting to order at 7:00 pm.
- 2. Mark Tarplee, N4UFP, a Rock Hill. SC. educator who is our newly elected ARRL South Carolina Section Manager presented the program. A slide show illustrated an organization structure consisting of the SC Section Manager supported by seven volunteer Assistant Section Managers. Assistant Section Managers serve as district emergency coordinators, official emergency station manager, official relay station manager, public information officer, and technical specialist. Mark Tarplee explained that his role as Section Manager was to: a) support the policies of the ARRL, b) promote public relations, and, c) Assist amateur radio licensees, and organizations. Principle activities that mirrored ASM titles were: a) emergency communication, b) government relations, c) information services, d) message traffic relay, e) public relation in the general community, and, f) solving technical problems. We learned that The ARRL Foundation awards grants of \$250 to \$2,500 primarily for promotion of amateur related youth activities. Colin grants are also available from the ARRL Foundation. N4UFP was uncertain as to the amounts and
- purpose. Since Colin and his wife were world renowned DXers of the former century, I surmise that a DXpedition would be most likely to receive such a grant. Grant information may be found on http://arrl.org/file%20grant. N4UFP ended his presentation by pledging undying support to DFARG and giving his email, phone number, and web addresses to President, Graham.
- 3. Acting Secretary, Jim Walters, read the minutes of the February meeting which were accepted by the membership as read.
- 4. Treasurer, Hugh Sammons, reported that during the previous accounting period He: a) received income of \$159.20, primarily from dues, b) paid a \$33.83, gas bill, c) reimbursed Legal Officer Jim Walters, \$214.50, for the property insurance premium Jim paid, and, d) ended the period with a \$1.812.30, account balance.
- 5. John Miller, Facilities Committee Chairman, was questioned as to the status of repairs to the Tower, antennas, and feed line. Hugh Sammons emphasized that it was important to restore service to the tower and work should proceed immediately. John agreed to move ahead with the project, obtained the tower climber's phone number from Jim Walters, then, was

- given approval for a \$300, disbursement to pay the climber \$250, and purchase materials and supplies to complete the job. John stated only connectors, clamps, and protective cable sheathing (PVC or electrical conduit) need be purchased as a spool of donated coax was stored at the operations center. Jack Jackson mentioned that a ham he had contacted was planning to fly a camera equipped drone over the tower to inspect and determine if the Yagi's feed line had been damaged by squirrels. Jim Walters requested and received clarification that tower work included only repair or replacement of the yagi feed line which was indicating a 6 to 1 SWR, and did not involve installation of or repairs to other antennas on the tower.
- 6) President, David Graham, recognized and introduced thee new visitors, possible new members, to the meeting. First, Bill Covey, W1GTT and his wife Jean, W1GTJ. Bill is a retired Connecticut state trooper now residing in Chapin. Second, Paul Travis, K0PT, who resides in Irmo. All three amateurs were warmly welcomed to the Group.
- 7) At closing, John Miller sought support for the contest he and Tom Francis designed and introduced at The January 2019, Board meeting. No action was taken.
